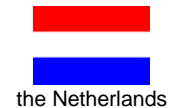

3. PROFILE OF SKILLS AND COMPETENCES

The most important duties of a Peace and security worker are:

Core task 1: Observes and protects an area or territory

- 1.1 Performs military observations
- 1.2 Performs entrance and exit checks
- 1.3 Performs surveillances and checks

Core task 2: Takes action in case of incidents and calamities

- 2.1 Takes action in case of incidents and calamities
- 2.2 Provides aid
- 2.3 Evaluates the action

Core task 3: Looks after his/her mental and physical fitness

- 3.1 Takes (preventive) measures against infectious diseases and stress
- 3.2 Supports his/her buddy and/or other group members
- 3.3 Builds his/her physical shape and keeps this shape

Core task 4: Performs coordinating duties

- 4.1 Coordinates the preparation of the assignment
- 4.2 Steers the realization of the assignment
- 4.3 Rounds off the coordination task

4. RANGE OF OCCUPATIONS ACCESSIBLE TO THE HOLDER OF THE CERTIFICATE

The Peace and security worker learns, works and lives in a military environment and performs duties for example in barracks, on board of ships and in the (military) field, inland or abroad.

<p>Access to next level of education/professions The certificate Peace and security must be considered a preparation for a career in the armed forces.</p> <p>The Peace and security worker, who meets the professional competence profile, can join the Royal Army, the Royal Marine, Royal Air Force and the Royal Military Police. To be accepted there, the Peace and security worker must first complete a general basic training. The senior secondary vocational education certificate of Peace and security worker also gives access to the Royal Military School (KMS). The functions a military can fulfil are very diverse, ranging from operational functions to technical or logistics functions.</p>	<p>International agreements</p>

6. OFFICIALLY RECOGNISED WAYS OF ACQUIRING THE CERTIFICATE

<p>Senior secondary vocational education features two learning pathways: the school-based pathway (bol) and the training on the job pathway (bbl). In the school-based pathway, the majority of the course consists of theory at school. The extent of the practical component (vocational practice) is between 20% and 60%. In the training on the job pathway, the extent of vocational practice is at least 60% of the course. The participant works four days a week in a training company, and attends school for theory subjects just one day a week. In principle it is possible to follow both learning pathways, but which pathway is offered will depend on the individual educational institution.</p>

<p>Entry requirements The certificate preparatory vocational secondary education (vmbo) basic vocational programme, or a comparable level.</p>
